A MESSAGE FROM JUDITH

The man, Jesus — a very human carpenter, born in a humble stall to an unmarried mother, whose three-year ministry of presence transformed the world.

Dear friends of Holy Trinity Church...

This year during Lent, we read from the Gospel According to Luke on all but one Sunday. Each lesson emphasizes Jesus' wisdom and compassion, as well as his commitment to truth-telling and peace-making.

The Gospel appointed for Lent I tells of Jesus being driven into the wilderness, where he is tempted, three times, by the devil. On Lent II, we see Jesus being steadfast in his mission in the face of threats, both from King Herod and from members of his own community. On Lent III, Jesus offers a reminder of God's patient forbearance in the parable of the fig tree. In this parable, Jesus tells us God is ready and willing to forgive all our sins whenever we are ready and willing to change our ways. The parable of the prodigal son, heard on the fourth Sunday of Lent, describes the joy we experience when we receive God's unconditional love. This year, on Lent V we read from the Gospel According to John. The setting is a meal at the home of Lazarus, who was raised by Jesus from the dead. The sisters of Lazarus, Martha and Mary, each play a role in this story, which foreshadows the events of Jesus' Passion.

The Lenten Gospels shows us the unique clarity of Jesus' vision. Jesus repeatedly meets temptation, faces challenges, and proclaims God's infinite, all-embracing love. He also encounters demands, misunderstandings, human extravagance and human despair. Yet through it all, Jesus remains a compassionate, non-anxious presence. We sometimes wonder how this is possible.

The answer is, in part, found in the spiritual disciplines which are at the heart of Jesus' capacities. During Lent, along with Christians throughout the world, we are invited to join with Jesus in being intentional about our own spiritual disciplines (prayer, meditation, silent reflection, loving service to others).

It is important to remember that spiritual disciplines are not meant to be harsh or punishing. Because although Lent is a penitential season, our penitence can serve God, others, and ourselves most fully if we find peace and joy in whatever we choose as our Lenten practices. It is healthful to seek a deepening of our spiritual life through a kind and caring approach to reforming ourselves: by service to others, through quiet contemplation, through praise, and with prayers of thanksgiving for blessings received. Some people like to follow a meditative ritual during Lent, such as reading "The Way of the Cross" one day a week, or by taking a silent retreat for a day, a half-day, or a weekend. Others prefer to read the Daily Office, either alone or in the company of others, to keep a journal of brief writings about the joys and despairs one experiences on a daily basis, or to gather in a study group to discuss matters of faith with other people.

Each of us probably has an idea about what "works" for us in terms of spiritual discipline, or spiritual practice. I hope you will share your thoughts and perspectives about such disciplines. One of the benefits of membership in a faith community is that others can learn from us — and we from them. Opening ourselves to different "ways of being" with God, in prayer, worship, and praise, can greatly aid our understanding of what it means to follow Jesus. Learning new ways to experience God's magnificence, and to feel God's love, can add richness and depth to our lives, and will most surely strengthen our Christian faith.

I believe that the season of Lent is a perfect time for such learning!

The Stewardship Prayer Group and the Finance Committee collaborated in an effort to educate our parishioners and be transparent about our finances. Our annual meeting was an example of communal stewardship. Incorporating the annual meeting into the Sunday worship service and sharing in the Holy Eucharist.

Mission and stewardship is the theme in the story of Jesus feeding the five thousand in Matthew 14:13-21. Mission isn't possible without stewardship and stewardship isn't healthy without mission. Are we willing to trust God and use what God has given us, in order to address our missional challenges to become a healthy mission focused congregation?
