

# Minutes from the 2019 Annual Meeting of Holy Trinity Church

The meeting was called to order at 9:40 A.M. by John Grant. Peg Nelson was named secretary, and she declared a quorum was present. A motion was made, seconded and carried to accept the minutes from the 2018 annual meeting.

Susan Howland presented the Treasurer's report and the vestry-approved 2019 balanced budget of \$115,319. Almost \$89,000 of that budget comes from pledges. Susan thanked Nancy Waugh for her many years as Stewardship Chair. She also thanked Lana Pieczynski, Josh Spooner and Peg Nelson as Finance Committee members; Lynn Garland, Josh Spooner and John Grant for their work on the Audit Committee, and Mick Kalber as Pledge Secretary.

The slate of officers, vestry members and other elected positions was presented on a printed sheet and read aloud by John. The floor was opened for nominations. For the Diocesan Convention, nominated as delegates were Lynn Garland (vestry) and Robin Yates (non vestry); as alternate delegates Nancy Waugh (vestry) and Susan Grant (non vestry).

The service continued.

After the homily, nominations from the floor were closed. There being none, the Secretary cast a single vote to accept the slate as provided.

John Grant presented his Senior Warden's annual report.

Mary Bridget Burns sent a message that Family Worship was there in spirit and thanked the vestry and Diane Nichols for supporting this ministry.

Fr. Richard opened the floor for discussion of any old or new business. There being none, a motion to adjourn the meeting was made, seconded and approved at 10:25.



#### Dear Friends,

Parish life is sometimes filled with a plethora of small details; like 'who is going to prepare the dining room?' and 'where did we store the crèche last year?' or also 'where are the batteries?' Sometimes it appears the round robin of questions on little bits of minutia can so dominate the focus in the moment, such that this can obscure the basic purpose of Church and spiritual community. So it pays a benefit to rehearse the facts: The Episcopal Church is not a church per se; the official charter of the Episcopal Church names the national body, and all its constituent parts, as "The Domestic & Foreign Missionary Society," or DFMS for short. The work of the society is filled by all its members, who go on mission in far flung parts of the world and in the adjacent neighborhood with equal vigor and focus. Christian organizations hold buildings and run program to give people skills in sharing the Gospel message. To restate the obvious: we exist for the sake of those who are not yet our members. Our spiritual journey in prayer (both private and public), our use of the sacraments, reading of scripture, participation in formation events; all fuel one purpose - to equip us with desire and skills to speak and act for Christ, that those who do not know the freedom of grace may find for themselves a life transformed in sharing the One Love that heals all the world. So often a quiet, understated, long-term witness is most compelling.

No happier pursuit could animate a human being; nor develop within a stronger faith. God grant you the blessings of another year to simply share the Love we have known.

# STEWARDSHIP PRAYER TEAM REPORT

The theme for the Pledge Drive this was a "Shining Our Light". This is something that Holy Trinity does very well. This year we considered our stewardship of sacred space. The Sanctuary is only available on Sunday but the people's need to spend time in sacred space extends well beyond that. So we created a small Prayer Garden in the front of the Fellowship Hall, easily visible and accessible from the sidewalk, that is available to anyone at any time of the day or night. It consists of a paved area in the shape of a cross. In the center there is a statue of an Infinity Cross that stands about four feet tall. Three concrete benches around the outer edges invite people to come in and spend time.

# **DAUGHTERS OF THE KING REPORT**

The Mary and Martha chapter of the Daughters of the King has had a very busy and productive year. It is the Order's mission to be the extension of Christ's Kingdom through prayer, service and evangelism. We, the Daughters, who vow to pray daily, maintain a prayer list petitioning for the healing, guidance, special concerns, the departed, and mourning of the parish. Along with our prayer mission, we engage in various outreach missions. We have continued to support St. Luke's Guesthouse by collecting various essential supplies throughout the year.

Every other month, we go to the Southbridge Rehabilitation Center to do arts and crafts with the residents. We provide the materials for the residents to create the crafts. In 2018, the residents made 30 Christmas cards for our servicemen in Iraq. This past Christmas, we doubled our card making, sending out 60 cards, filled with candy, granola bars, and packets of hot chocolate mix. We particularly love this ministry since it gives the residents the opportunity to support our troops with heart felt written messages, as well as providing some Christmas joy for our active servicemen.

In September, we were honored to welcome Lorraine Brumskine into our chapter of the DOK. In October, we Daughters hosted a Provincial Retreat here at Holy Trinity. A significant amount of planning went into this retreat. Lorraine, as our guest speaker, played an integral role in the retreat. The focus of her speech was on growing up in

Liberia, her struggles, personal loss and pain as the result of a corrupt government coup. Lorraine's presentation was outstanding. She demonstrated how the power of faith can lead one through the most horrendous of circumstances.

As a part of our ministry, we have begun to reach out to and visit various members of our parish, who are unable to attend church services. Through fellow Daughter and Eucharistic Minister, Laura Gervais, Holy Communion can be offered to these individuals, as well as visiting with them.

We also take a collection of funds at each meeting. We then distribute all the funds we raise and donate them to various charitable organizations. Recently, we have donated funds to Reconciliation House, Abby's House and to the Walking Together and Laundry Love ministries.

As the Daughters move into 2020, our goals include continuing our outreach ministries with both St. Luke's Guesthouse and Southbridge Rehabilitation Center. We will also be assisting Suzy Sharp and the Mission Plate committee in identifying various charitable organizations to send our mission plate donations to.

We are looking forward to 2020 to discern what God is calling each of us to do as individuals and as Daughters. We encourage other women in the parish to join us to live out our faith in prayer and service.

As we did this, we also met multiple times with Father Richard and others in the church who wanted to help us find a new curriculum to move forward with as our children get older.

There have been many activities that the Family Worship group has participated in. In February, Family Worship attended a Christian skate night at Interskate 91 and had a great time spending it together outside of church. On Good Friday, the children created "resurrection gardens" after the service. A group of our children went through the steps to make first communion in June. We are very proud of all the hard work they put in. We thank Eileen DeMings for running this class on behalf of the Family Worship team. We also put on another Christmas play called "Frozen too". The play was a huge hit and we enjoyed having so many parish members present.

The Family Worship Ministry is always adapting to the ever-changing needs, ages, and stages of our children - many of whom will be considered "pre-teen" next year!

# VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

VBS was held at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in August, during Family Worship on Sunday mornings. This was our 9th consecutive year! The theme was "Yee Haw" and we continue to use the curriculum from Group Publishing as our core group is familiar and comfortable with it. We chose to make this year just Family Worship families and had 14 registered children and 6 adult volunteers. We held everything in the parish hall.

Funding for Vacation Bible School continues to be a high priority. Sponsorships from the congregation, as well as food donations, made a large impact on our budget. Each VBS child was given a T-shirt, bible buddy, and photo frame with a picture of the whole group.

Planning for VBS started late this year. We had one meeting with the core staff. Ordering of materials was done in July. We ordered extra supplies and returned them for a refund after VBS ended. This was helpful!

VBS is a strong ministry that continues to provide a safe and loving environment for our children during the summer.

# FOOD PANTRY AT BLESSED JOHN PAUL II PARISH MINISTRY REPORT

To begin this report, I want to thank everyone who has so generously helped support our local food pantry and encourage everyone to continue these good works. I especially want to acknowledge and thank Bill Nelson for bringing our donations over to the food pantry at St. John Paul II in a timely fashion.

When I first took on this project, I thought that it might be useful and more personal to issue a challenge of sorts; so I suggested that we donate non-perishable food items that we each would like to find at the food pantry if we were in need of a comforting meal and had no money to buy ingredients. Over time, I still think doing that would be an act of love toward those in our community who are less fortunate. While this is supposed to be a report of what has happened this past year, I also want to again issue a challenge: please consider donating one of your favorite foods, a comfort food, a favorite ingredient, or something more unusual that one does not typically find in a food pantry - \*something that would nourish one's soul as well as one's stomach.

For the most part, our desire is to provide people who visit the food pantry items that they are actually looking for. The food pantry can get practically free food from the Worcester County Food Bank (WCFB) when it comes to many of the staples we might think of, such as rice, pasta, canned meats, etc. What they do not get practically free are the kind of things that make those staples into a meal. For example, the WCFB prefers not to get donations of items in glass jars, which would mean that foods like tomato sauce and pickles are not among the foods that the food pantry would get from WCFB. I am again including a chart of items that the pantry could use because they do not get them from the Food Bank.

# I'm a Little Too Fat, a Little Too Giving. I Think I Know Why.

Using the hunger I experienced as a kid to teach mine the power of generosity

I was five years old when my mom took off with me to the coast. She said she needed a do-over. We were starting fresh, with no belongings, no toys, no furniture. She said we had empty hands so that we could catch new blessings. We also had empty pockets, and she had no job. She'd drank our whole life away, and the booze had left us washed up in a tiny beach town called Rockaway, Oregon. She was hoping the ocean would catch her tears and loosen her chains.

My mother loves the ocean. She is more herself when it is nearby. She believes that it sees and knows, that it moves and feels. It inspires her wonder and fear. She revels in the uncertainty that it could become angry at any moment and take lives at its will. To my mother, the ocean is God. "Don't you ever take it for granted, Krissy," she would say to me. "When you look at that ocean, remember there's always something bigger than you. Respect her."

Summer had just ended, and the quaint coastal town had begun to fold up. We found a small cottage—really a motel room with a kitchenette. We never said it was our home; to us, it was just "Number Six." My mother paid the first month's rent, enrolled me in kindergarten a block away, and bought us a sack of potatoes and some ketchup. And we began our new life.

I don't remember being excited about school. It seemed so frivolous, and I thought I should be getting a job. "I could get a paper route," I told my mother one night as we walked back to Number Six from the pay phone, where she'd called my dad, begging him to send the \$75 child support check. He promised he'd send it as soon as possible, but I knew the potatoes were running low.

My mother looked for work, but the car we'd used to get to the town had broken down, and there were only two or three restaurants within walking distance of Number Six. She didn't want to get a job in a bar because she was trying earnestly to stop drinking.

Maybe two weeks passed and still no child support check—no money at all. I sat at the kitchen table one night, watching Walter Cronkite deliver the evening news with his objectivity and journalistic integrity. He said something like, "Here is the news at this suppertime." I remember this because I was so surprised by it. His words were otherwise so dry, so metered, but his mention of it being dinnertime was almost friendly. I wondered if he could see us; how did he know it was time to eat?

My mother was staring out the window with her back to me. I said to her, "Well? He's right. It is dinnertime. Right, Mom?" I thought I was being clever in catching Cronkite's sincerity.

She let out a sigh. Without turning around she said, "Do you see that out there? Those people have let their garden grow over. The cabbages have gone to seed now. They'd never know or care if I just snuck over and took one for you." The quivering in her voice scared me. She turned to me and wiped her eyes. With a look so cool I thought she might have been mad at me, she said, "If I were a thief, I would go over there and steal those rotten cabbages for you. But I am not a thief." Without another word, she passed me and walked out the front door of Number Six. She left it open, and I followed her. She walked down five cottages and knocked on the door to Number One—a larger cottage, where an old man and woman lived. Even though they were our neighbors, we had no idea who they were. The old lady opened the door, and I wove around my mother so I could see inside. "This is my daughter, Kristine," my mother stated. "We have no food. She's had nothing to eat but potatoes for a month, and now we don't even have any of those left. I don't care about myself, but could you please give her something to eat?"

The old woman was short and fat with dark skin and black hair twisting around her head. Her name was Anita Vanover. Her husband was a tall white man who was just called Van. I could see into their cottage; the table was set, and Anita and Van were obviously just sitting down to eat. The smells coming from inside made me drool. I don't remember Anita saying anything to my mother or even asking her husband first if she could give us something, but I remember her packing up her table: the pot roast, the carrots, the gravy, the potatoes. She handed it all to my mother. It turned out that the couple had friends who owned one of the restaurants where my mom had tried to get a job. Anita talked to them, and they hired her. Anita and Van became my caretakers in the evening. They saved my mother and me. At that moment, though, I don't think Anita and Van thought they were saving lives or forever changing the path of a child. I think they thought they were doing what they were supposed to do when a woman with a little girl comes to the door and says she

needs to eat. What more needs to be said or done? They probably figured that it's just food.

When you give the best you have to someone in need, it translates into something much deeper to the receiver. It means that they are worthy.

Anita gave so effortlessly and so quickly that I doubt she ever thought about it again. But that one moment taught me a lesson about giving that I have never forgotten. There came a day 30 years later, when I passed that lesson on to my own children.

My daughter's school had a food drive, and she was excited to collect food for it. Even at 10 years old, she had a strong sense of community. She wanted to be either a police officer so she could help people or an astronaut so she could protect the planet from wayward asteroids. We had to keep her from watching the news because it moved her to the point of tears. Her heart would break for the human condition. She went to our pantry and started bagging up the canned and dry goods. All the while, she talked. "Oh, I'll put in the green beans, I don't like those... I'll save the Kraft macaroni and cheese. We can give them some no-name brand." And I realized that my daughter—as generous and good as she already was—knew nothing about giving. I felt like I had taught her nothing. She didn't know about Anita and Van. She didn't know about Number Six. She didn't know that she could see the face of a hungry child if she looked long enough at her own mother. So I told her. I told her that my kindergarten teacher thought I was "retarded" because I was so hungry that I didn't perform well in school and was always slower than the rest of the class. I told her that Anita could have just gone to her cupboard and made me a peanut butter sandwich, and my mother and I would have been so grateful. But she didn't. She gave the best she had.

The biggest problem with poverty is the shame that comes with it. When you give the best you have to someone in need, it translates into something much deeper to the receiver. It means they are worthy. If it's not good enough for you, it's not good enough for those in need either. Giving the best you have does more than feed an empty belly—it feeds the soul.

Donate to your local food bank today, and give them the best you can.

# SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

As I complete my term as Senior Warden, preparing this Senior Warden's Annual Report, I reflect upon that which has transpired in the two short years since I took up this position. When I was first approached to join the Vestry, I was humbled. When I was then approached to put in my name for the senior warden position, I was uncertain. The assistance of the leadership community here at HTC has proven invaluable and the guidance of the Holy Spirit has shepherded me through.

This task, which was daunting at first, has been made attainable by the contributions and assistance of all the Vestry, Father Richard, and the entire congregation. Long before I became Senior Warden the lay leadership at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church had adopted "discernment & consensus" as the governance model. We have a wide range of talents and perspectives, when combined cooperatively, we are a force to be reckoned with.

The Holy Spirit has guided us, helping us make connections to the greater church, the Episcopal Diocese of Wester Massachusetts and beyond. In April our own Tamsin Lucey attended the "Convocation – 2019 – Brave Change: Courageous Churches" at the BTS Center in Bangor Maine. This was an ecumenical event organized by the Maine Conference of the UCC, The Maine Council of Churches and the BTS Center. Tamsin prepared and delivered a "Pesha Kusha" slide show which showed our journey as a parish, from a full-time pastor to a part time pastor, showing the challenges we faced along the way.

In May, members of the Vestry attended the "Small Church Summit" and again in September attended the "Small Church Summit 2.0". These events were organized and led by the Reverend Pam Mott, Canon of the Ordinary of the Episcopal Diocese of Western Massachusetts. These events gave us the opportunity to meet with the lay leadership of various other "small churches" in the diocese. We listened to issues and challenges facing other parishes. We became aware how other parishes faced challenges such as those that we face at Holy Trinity. We also shared our challenges and successes; our discernment process, the creation of our parish profile, and the acceptance of the fact that a part time pastor could fill our spiritual needs.

Recently, the Diocese had put us in contact with the Reverend José Reyes. Father Reyes is the Diocesan Missioner for Hispanic Ministries, and in Worcester at All Saints and now at St. Marks. Fr. Jose has met with the vestry and has blessed us with his insight and optimism. He has many ideas to connect with the community in Southbridge, not only to connect with the Hispanic community, but to connect to the community at large. We look forward to meeting with Fr. José again soon, this time with the congregation.

As for celebrations, we had a very successful and well attended 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the church building. Which included the picnic at Westville Dam on Saturday, June 15<sup>th</sup>, and the service on Sunday, June 16<sup>th</sup>. The many returning clergy and parishioners highlighted these events, as did the presence of the bishop, the Most Reverend Douglas Fisher who officiated that Sunday.

(I know it was a successful picnic, as the number of hamburgers and hotdogs that I flipped exceeded my projections!)

# ADMINISTRATIVE AND BUILDING

## **BUILDING AND GROUNDS REPORT**

The Building Committee, Tamsin Lucey, Susan Howland, Jean Frost and Nate Lowery look at the current and long-term needs of our 150-year-old building and arrange for work to be done. The building committee met informally in 2019 but primarily by email and text.

The major initiative was to evaluate how we might upgrade the classroom wing with the hope and prospect of renting the space, while also addressing the exterior maintenance.

**2019 Capital Improvement and Major Repairs: Cost: \$13,907** \$3,500 from the budget and the balance from the Building and Savings Fund.

- Repaired the foyer steps: \$4,000
- Replaced the metal ridge cap at the rear of the sanctuary: \$1,800 with expert drone work by Joe Pieczynski who took drone photos for evaluation of the roof line and ridge cap.
- Replaced 2 Emergency Exit signs: \$488
- Replaced two programmable Thermostats \$744
- Installation of 3 new window screens in the downstairs Kitchen. \$220
- Purchase of a Vacmaster HEPA Vac \$191
- Replaced all 13 steam radiator vents: \$1,005
- Prayer Garden: \$959
- Architect Contract: Feasibility study of the Classroom wing: zoning, handicap accessibility, building codes.
   \$4,500

# Repair and Maintenance: \$3,031

In addition to the capital improvements, regular repair and maintenance was done: this budget line was under budget, so we put the remaining \$2,000 in reserve as we know we will have a large heating repair bill to pay in 2020. Costs included:

- Boiler tune-up and boiler repairs \$379 00
- Boiler inspection certificates: \$100
- Building inspection certificates: \$200
- The Town of Southbridge Health Department inspected the kitchen. Food service permit issued. No fee with petition for fee waiver.
- Fire Alarm monitoring, inspection and service calls: \$730
- Fire extinguisher and exit light inspection: \$95
- Snow removal: \$1,077
- Supplies for repair and maintenance: \$450
- Episcopal Church sign refurbished
- There were some rather extensive issues with the steam radiators, the big boiler heating system that turned out to be air getting into the fuel line. An old pump has not been reinstalled and has taken care of the problem. We are still awaiting the final report on why this happened along with the bill that took some time and many call outs to get to the bottom of or words to that effect.

# We will identify Capital Repairs and Improvements for 2020. Some already identified:

- Re-shingle the street side of the parish hall ~\$6000
- Replace the Parish Hall windows (One bid \$18,642)
- Repair, scrape and paint the trim on the church (One bid for \$29,363.00, with tower add \$20,924.00)
- There are a few windows that are broken and the stained glass windows need to be evaluated

Brian Canty volunteers his time to work on repair projects. Among the Projects in 2019 were: painting the undercroft kitchen, fixing flaps in both toilets in the undercroft, mending and put up the coat closet sign, building and installing the sign post for the renovated Episcopal Church sign, repairing the concrete on the top step to the undercroft, and putting a breeze block under the ramp to support it on the return corner.

We thank our sexton, Greg Nikolla, for keeping the building clean, neat, and safe, and for keeping the snow cleared. Greg is always responsive to any task that might come his way.

We are ever grateful for all the "Building Angels" (you know who you are!) who take care of small repairs if they see a need. Additionally, a shout-out to Tamsin who gives generously of her time and talent dealing with many day-to-day issues, and keeping the clutter and entropy in check; Jean has taken on the programing of the thermostats and is always willing to think through issues and do what is needed. Nate jumps in when needed especially for architectural advice.

Finally, we thank all the "Grounds Angels" who work in quiet ways taking care of mowing, planting, raking and many other jobs. We thank Bill Nelson for scheduling the mowing in 2019, Ray Beaupre for trimming the foundation plantings, and Paul Aloia rail painting the railings and dealing with the sidewalk weeds. They are all wonderful stewards of our property

## FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The mission and purpose of the Finance Committee is to serve as stewards of the financial resources of the parish. While the Vestry has ultimate responsibility for all the resources of the parish, the Finance Committee can share this responsibility, and that of the treasurer, by bringing its knowledge and experience to bear on parish financial matters.

The Finance Committee is a Committee of advice to the Vestry. The Vestry approves its members. The responsibilities of the Finance Committee are to provide the Treasurer with a group of thoughtful, committed members of the parish with whom the treasurer can discuss ideas and parish financial matters, and assist in the development of the annual parish budget.

The Finance Committee met twice in 2019: once to discuss employee and other human resource matters and a second time to work on the budget. We met numerous times by email; all members spent significant time reviewing financial matters of the parish, working on rental agreements, and possible uses of our unused space.

A draft budget was presented to the vestry in October. By the time the majority of the pledge cards were received we were looking at a significant deficit budget. But, by January we were able, with some minor revisions to present the vestry with a balanced budget.

We would like to thank the members of the 2019 Audit Committee, Lynn Garland, chair, John Grant and Josh Spooner for their diligent and timely work to complete the audit. We also are grateful for the work of our long-time pledge secretary, Mick Kalber, and our bookkeeper, Chris Bolte, who help the parish with financial accounting and accountability. And, we welcome Lynn Garland as the new Stewardship Chair.

As always, we pray for the needs and ongoing work of the church.

# TREASURER'S REPORT

#### **Operating Budget**

**Income:** overall income was under budget by \$2,700. Some income was over budget, but pledges fell behind this year. We ended the year in a good position to head into 2020.

**Expenses:** Expenses will be discussed in two categories: Operating expenses and Capital Improvement Expense:

- Operating expenses were \$104,650.56 which is about \$10,000 under budget. This is primarily due to the fact that we did not need to buy a large quantity of oil before the year's end, but the funds have been reserved for when we will make a large purchase for our 7,500 gallon tank.
- The capital improvement expense was \$13,906 which is about \$10,500 over budget. The building committee, with vestry approval recommended a number of necessary building projects and the needed funds were taken from savings. (See Building and Grounds report for details.) An additional capital project was hiring an architect to evaluate what we can and cannot do with the un/underused classroom wing.
- The hospitality line is over budget this year because the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary committee was given the go-ahead to plan for the wonderful brunch/lunch we had after the 150<sup>th</sup> celebration Eucharist with the bishop.
- Many lines were under budget, some because funds were not needed and others because of frugal spending; this helped offset the over budget lines.

**Non-operating Budget:** The non-operating or other Income/expense section contains extra-budgetary funds received and designated or restricted for a particular mission or purpose.

- We received \$180 to be added to the Legacy Fund principal.
- \$1,313.48 was donated to the Organ Maintenance Fund in honor of and Thanksgiving for Anne Bouvier Monroe.
- A gift of \$100 was given to the Clergy Discretionary Fund.
- A \$1,000 gift was given to fund the purchase of the Lift Every Voice and Sing hymnal. .
- The Parrettie Fund income was \$8,000.

# **Outreach: Total \$9,562.70**

- Childreach/PLAN: \$400 was donated and sent to Childreach to sponsor Nicholas in Kenya.
- The 2019 United Thank Offering was \$908.25
- Food Share: The 2nd Sunday loose plate for Food Share was \$632 which included \$171 from the "Souper Bowl" soup sale.
- The mission plate offerings were \$1,357.59 and were given to various missions (separate report).
- The Good Friday offering was sent to the church in Jerusalem: \$25
- The Ecumenical Thanksgiving Service offering of \$345 was given to St. Luke's Guesthouse.
- Parrettie Fund alms given to various people in need: \$3,504.86
- The Rector's discretionary fund inflow for 2019 was \$2,400 funded from the Parrettie Fund, with \$2,390 given in alms to various people in need.

#### A few other notes:

- In 2019 we re-established the John C. Dirlam Fund, a fund closed in the 1980's that was intended for building needs. This was done by restructuring the endowment portfolio. The John C. Dirlam Fund will now be a permanent fund and the income reserved for building needs.
- Using funds donated previously, the last Station of the Cross was installed for Easter. This set of 12 Stations of the Cross was crafted by the artist and sculptor, Marc Fuller.
- Community Garden Project: \$600. Tamsin Lucey partnered with Ciro DiMeglio who is passionate about reclaiming abandoned town property. Tamsin wrote two grants funded by Cornerstone (\$300) and Hometown (\$300) Banks to purchase water irrigation for the reclaimed lot on Mechanic Street.
- Prayer/Meditation Garden: the vestry approved money from the legacy Fund and Memorial gifts to construct a prayer garden at the front of the church. All labor and fabrication of stones and benches were donated, primarily by Cat Reith-Lowery (and family) and Lynn Garland. (More on this project in 2020. A 3<sup>rd</sup> bench was donated by Nancy Waugh in memory of her husband Richard Waugh.
