A Reflection from your Priest-in-Charge

O Lord, you are my portion and my cup; it is you who uphold my lot.

[Psalm 16:5]

We are now in the liturgical season of Ordinary Time, which ends on November 20th. "Ordinary time" translates the Latin term *tempus per annum* (literally "time through the year"). The liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green – the color of life and hope. On the Sundays in Ordinary Time we hear about Jesus' ministry—stories about miracles, hopes fulfilled, and unexpected lessons learned. We witness in Scripture and prayer the working of the Holy Spirit in ways both subtle and surprising. We watch and listen for the whispers of the Holy Spirit in our own hearts and minds.

Between the pandemic and legislative responses to recent Supreme Court decisions, I think many of us forget what an "ordinary day" feels like. Our lives have been changed forever, and we are understandably bewildered. Through our faith and our relationships, we will live into this bewilderment, trusting that we will find our way in a world we don't quite recognize any more.

May we continue to be surprised by the

the path to which God has called us, and may we continue to venture beyond the predictable.

I love this meditation on ordinary time by one of my favorite poets, Enuma Okoro:

From "Passing Ordinary Time":

This ordinary time is gifted in its quiet, marked passing Christ slips about calling and baptizing, sending and affirming, pouring his Spirit like water into broken cisterns, sealing cracks and filtering our senses, that we may savor the foolish simplicity of his grace.

May we share "the foolish simplicity" of God's grace as we help each other prepare for *the new thing* that God is doing in the Life we share.

Mutual Ministry Covenant

The following list of the responsibilities of the Priest-in-Charge, Vestry, and Congregation is designed to clarify expectations and to be the basis for effective communication so that we will continue to grow in our faith and mission, guided by the Holy Spirit.

Responsibilities of the Priest-in-Charge

Trinity

Episcopa

The Priest-in-Charge is responsible for pastoral oversight of the congregation, collaborating with the Wardens and Vestry in planning worship, faith formation, administration, and communication.

- 1. Lead the liturgy and administer the sacraments.
- Work with the lay leadership to identify the needs of the parish and coordinate with the Faith Formation Steering Committee to offer Christian formation programs for all ages
- Meet regularly with the members of lay ministries and collaborate with the Vestry to conduct an annual Mutual Ministry Review.
- Collaborate with the lay leadership in developing ministries in Worship, Faith Formation, Pastoral Care/Fellowship, and Outreach/Community Partnerships
- 5. Participate in parish and diocesan events as feasible.
- Develop ecumenical partnerships for shared worship and mission.
- Oversee the administration of the parish and delegate responsibilities as appropriate in collaboration with the Wardens
- 8. Oversee staff, in collaboration with the Wardens and the Chair of the Building Committee
- Oversee the compilation, proofreading, and distribution of Tidings in collaboration with the Parish Administrator and lay ministers
- 10. Oversee weekly Announcements in collaboration with the Parish Administrator and lay ministers
- 11. Collaborate with the Wardens in arranging for liturgical and pastoral care during vacation time

12. Collaborate with the Executive Committee to prepare the Agenda for Vestry and parish meetings

- 13. Model good self-care by managing work hours, private time and family time.
- 14. Model servant leadership and community building.

Responsibilities of the Wardens and Vestry

The Wardens and Vestry are responsible for collaborating with the Priest-in-Charge to monitor the pulse of the congregation, develop inclusive ministries, and explore new ways to engage with the community.

- Coordinate responses to incoming emails regarding non-clergy matters
- · Postings on the parish website, HTC Facebook pages, and other platforms
- · Decide when all-parish emails will be sent and what information will be included
- Decide when MailChimp notices will be sent and what information will be included
- 3. Collaborate with the Priest-in-Charge to determine priorities for planning future ministries
- 4. Be models of the hospitality of Christ by welcoming all.

Responsibilities of the Members of the Congregation

The members of the congregation are responsible for sharing in the stewardship of the building and ministries, participating in ministries according to their gifts, and communicating clearly with the Priest-in-Charge, Wardens, and Vestry.

- 1. Contribute time, treasure, and talent to the mission of Holy Trinity
- 2. Participate in parish life and events
- 3. Share in maintenance of the building and grounds

NEW: Praying Hands Ministry

Our Praying Hands Ministry makes prayer shawls and lap blankets for anyone in need of prayer and comfort. We use the creation of a shawl (or blanket) to focus our prayer as we pray for others with our hands.

On July 17th Mother Judith will bless new prayer shawls and we will offer our first workshop on crocheting and knitting during coffee hour. If you knit or crochet or would like to learn, please feel free to join us. Some basic materials, patterns and prayer ideas will be shared.

If you already knit or crochet and want to get started, you can create a rectangular shawl in any knit/crochet pattern that is approximately 20" X 54" (a lap blanket is 26" X 34" minimum, but it can be a little larger). Or, a triangular shawl that is approximately 50" along the top neck edge and 25" from center neck to the triangle point. Any soft yarn will work; bulky yarn works up quickly.

Don't knit or crochet, but wish to contribute? Donate 3-4 oz. skeins of washable, bulky yarn.

There is a basket with blessed prayer shawls at the back of the church. Shawls can be taken for anyone in need of prayer, love, and comfort. A card is attached to write in the person's name.



Cooking For Life.

A ministry of Holy Trinity in Partnership with St Luke's Guesthouse in Southbridge.

The first classes of Cooking for Life – have HAPPENED! We are off to a great start. Participants were able to choose their own recipe, make it from scratch with supervision and learn how to adapt the recipe for available ingredients and different meals. One participant chose eggs, so we made easy pan omelets (which

were eaten as part of lunch), Cheese Dreams (ham and cheese in a French toast sandwich), and a breakfast casserole that could be eaten for lunch or supper with an easy switch to make it a dessert by adding fruit instead of meat, cheese and vegetables.

If you would like to support this new ministry by volunteering to be a chaperone for the class please know that the schedule is deliberately loose to accommodate the participants who work nontraditional hours. Vestry Highlights: June 8 2022

Resolved

- ✓ Approved a Covenant Agreement for the Clergy, Vestry, and Congregation. (copies are available in the back of the church)
- ✓ Approved a Licensing Agreement to rent a room to Jessica Cahill to be a home office
- ✓ Approved funds for repairing the Fire Escape so that it will meet building code
- ✓ Approved a new organizational plan for hosting Coffee Hour
- ✓ Approved a new ministry: *Praying Hands*

Covenant Agreement

This Covenant Agreement is included in this issue of Tidings and is posted on our website. It replaces the Covenant signed in 2014, and it delineates the different responsibilities of the Priest-in-Charge, the Wardens & Vestry, and the Congregation so that communication will be clear. The Priest-in-Charge is responsible for *pastoral oversight* of the congregation, including liturgy, sacraments, formation, administration and staff. The Wardens and Vestry are responsible for the *governance* of the congregation, including finances, building management, communication and planning. Members of the congregation are responsible for *sharing* their time, treasure, and talent for the ministry of HolyTrinity, and to share in programming, building maintenance, and worship. The Covenant Agreement emphasizes the *collaborative* relationship between the clergy, lay leaders, and members of the congregation.

Licensing Agreement for Office Space

We have begun a new practice at Holy Trinity that may lead to a new way to help finance our building maintenance as well as support our neighbors. Beginning on July 1st we will lease office space to Jessica Cahill, who lives just two buildings away on Hamilton Street.

Repairing the Fire Escape

The fire escape off the parish hall did not pass the safety inspection this year. Repairing it is a major expense, requiring a basic rebuilding of the structure and refastening it to the building. The work will include: providing a cement pad for bottom of the stairs, welding side rails that are currently loose, securing support legs to existing concrete pads, reattaching all loose & unattached support brackets, at the same time leveling the turn landing, which is currently sloping towards the building because the 3 of the 4 support brackets have rusted away; the project includes power washing, wire brushing, and painting the structure with anti-rust and black oil gloss paint.



Practicing our Faith: Episcopal Beliefs and Practices



Fundraising for Ukraine

WE are Truly Blessed: Thank You for embracing this call to Stand with and Support Ukraine.



As you may remember, at the end of March, Lynn Garland and I delivered 575 lbs. – 35 boxes of Over-the-Counter Medical Supplies which were shipped to L'viv in western Ukraine. Yes – we did that... However, I underestimated by \$230 the amount that was needed for shipping – Holy Trinity Church kindly fronted all the shipping costs (\$500) – anyone who would like to help offset that shortage may make a donation to Holy Trinity noting Ukraine Shipping – Thank you very much.

Cans and Bottle funds collected in April and May totaled **\$442.65**. Monies were sent to Episcopal and Relief Development for Ukraine at the beginning on June.

Homemade Lemonade sales during the Summer – I have been selling – for a donation - the very best homemade lemonade – as first made by our very own VBS team many years ago – since Farmers Market season began on June 1. So far I have collected well over \$200 – this money and any more collected through the end of August will be sent to World Central Kitchen, which is currently providing thousands of meals (breakfast, lunch and dinner) every day to Ukrainians in Ukraine and refugees in surrounding countries.
