I came across this passage by Dorothy Day as I was reflecting on what to write for this issue of Tidings. I wasn't "groaning within myself," but her words startled me. I know that I am not alone in being haunted by this question almost every day: What can I do? The answer is simple: Love. To love is our natural inclination, to be loved our deepest desire. As a result, we are capable of inventing and sharing a thousand different ways of loving. If we have run out of ways

to love or if we have lost sight of any signs of love, we need only be still, and in the silence we will glimpse a new way to love, hear an unexpected expression of love.

It is the one guarantee of this life – that we will witness love. We have the eyes to see and the ears to hear and the voice to speak, if we will but allow ourselves to be surprised.

Loving is what we *do*, created in the image of a God who is Love, reborn into the Body of Christ, Incarnate Love.

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The Episcopal Church General Convention: What is it and why does it matter?

The General Convention is the governing body of the Episcopal Church. It meets every 3 years to discuss and pass resolutions, some of which will affect the canons and the people in the pews directly, and others that set a course of action for the "mind of the church", as guided by the Holy Spirit. The convention meets in two houses: the House of Deputies and the House of Bishops, much like the structure of our federal legislature. Every diocese elects 8 deputies, 4 clergy and 4 lay, to the House of Deputies and all bishops, retired or not, are eligible to sit in the House of Bishops. Resolutions are discussed in both houses; and to pass, both houses must concur.

The 80th General Convention met in Baltimore on July 8th - 11th, 2022. This was a one year delay and a significantly shortened convention due to COVID. Most of the debate/discussion about the 425 resolutions, usually done during convention, was done on Zoom prior to convention, and some resolutions were postponed until General Convention 2024.

80th General Convention: shortened, masked, tested, legislated -- a few highlights:

* approved the first reading of a constitutional change to clearly define the Book of Common Prayer. If the change passes at the 81st General Convention in 2024, this would define the Book of Common Prayer as "those liturgical forms and other texts authorized by the General Convention."

- * two women will lead the House of Deputies for the first time in history. Ayala Harris, president and the Rev. Rachel Taber-Hamilton, vice president, are the first people of color serving together as leaders of the House of Deputies.
- * passed Resolution B003 Regulating Ghost Guns and 3D Printed Guns proposed by Bishop Fisher. This resolution will be sent on for action to Office of Government Relations, and members of the Episcopal Public Policy Network.
- * passed Resolution D083 "affirming that all Episcopalians should be able to access abortion services and birth control with no restriction on movement, autonomy, type, or timing."
- continued reckoning with the church's systemic racism by passing Resolution A125: "to establish a voluntary Episcopal Coalition for Racial Equity and Justice among dioceses parishes, organizations, and individuals dedicated to the work of becoming the Beloved Community."
- * The House of Bishops issued a statement during the final day of General Convention naming the climate crisis as the overarching issue that affects all the other issues of social justice that convention has considered.

On July 10th, our church was blessed with a visit from Graciene Riche. Graciene is Lorraine Brumskine's sister who is visiting from Liberia. Graciene runs a children's ministry in Buchanan, Liberia which is affiliated with St. John Irving Episcopal Church there.

In reflecting on our mission partnership, Graciene expressed how grateful the people of the community are for our continued support of their children's ministry programs. During coffee hour, Graciene presented a slide show showing the "love in action" of her ministry. They are in the process of building another boarding school for these children. The need is great to shelter, feed, and educate them. The churches run the boarding schools in Liberia. The boarding schools are a safe haven for them in what can be a harsh world. Graciene stated that the building of the new boarding school is slowly coming together as funds become available to continue the construction. If you missed Graciene's presentation, it is available for viewing on our church's website.

We are very fortunate to have this dynamic relationship in our mission partnership with Liberia. How often do we give to a charity in another country and never know the impact of what our gifts mean to those living there? When I viewed Graciene's presentation, I saw the happy faces of these same children who are receiving our donations. The supplies that we donate—the clothing, school supplies, toiletries, and PPE supplies—help sustain these same precious children. The presence and glory of God binds us in His work on earth. "He's got the whole wide world in His hands."

We sent out our latest shipment of two large barrels of supplies on July 20th. Please continue to send in donations of supplies. Every little bit helps these children living in poverty. Donations can be dropped off in the foyer before and after our church services or during office hours on Tuesdays and Thursdays 10:00am to 1:00pm.

Financial Summary: as of June 30, 2022

The good news is income is over budget by \$8,677. The following are contributing factors:

- The pledges are over budget with the addition of a couple of pledges received after the budget was voted on.
- Plate offerings are over budget being back to in-person services all year.
- The budgeted unfulfilled pledges is over budget because our committed parishioners keep up with their pledges.
- There was a donation received and the donor had no restrictions.

Additional good news: we are under budget with expenses \$2,960. The following are contributing factors:

- We have delayed ordering oil in hopes that the prices will come down.
- The hospitality budget is over budget because of returning to coffee hour and the decision to return to our green initiative by using more eco-friendly disposable cups and dishes.
- The capital improvement account includes the repair to the undercroft stairs and the repair to the thermostats to the boiler.
