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A Reflection by your Priest -in -Charge

I wonder, as I wander out under the sky How Jesus the Savior had come for to die For poor orn'ry creatures like you and like I I wonder as I wander out under the sky.

These words have been running through my mind as Advent begins this year. Their haunting mix of wonder and longing captures for me the meaning of this season. The history of the song shows that we never know the wondrous effects of our smallest acts and our chance encounters.

The carol has its origins in a song fragment collected in 1933 by folklorist John Jacob Niles. While in the town of Murphy in North Carolina, Niles attended a fundraising meeting held by evangelicals who had been ordered out of town by the police. He wrote of hearing the song:

A girl had stepped out to the edge of the little platform attached to the automobile. She began to sing. Her clothes were unbelievably dirty and ragged, and she, too, was unwashed. Her ashblond hair hung down in long skeins.... But, best of all, she was beautiful, and in her untutored way, she could sing. She smiled as she sang, smiled rather sadly, and sang only a single line of a song.

The girl, Annie Morgan, repeated the fragment seven times in exchange for a quarter per performance. Based on this fragment, Niles composed the version of *I Wonder as I Wander* that is known today, extending the melody to four lines and the lyrics to three stanzas.

Iwonder...

What grace—and longing—do we share with the young girl who sang 89 years ago for less than two dollars in a town most of us have never heard of?

 $I wonder \dots$

How we can ignore a God who has promised to be revealed in the obscure and untended "stables" of our lives, a God who has promised us a star to guide us no matter how dark the night in which we wander

 $I wonder \dots$

How we, *orn'ry"* creatures that we are, can give ourselves permission to wonder as we wander .during the coming weeks.

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

Neil deGrasse Tyson, *Starry Messenger: Cosmic Perspectives on Civilization* Henry Holt and Co. (September 20, 2022)

Bringing his cosmic perspective to civilization on earth, Neil deGrasse Tyson shines new light on the crucial fault lines of our time—war, politics, religion, truth, beauty, gender, and race—in a way that stimulates a deeper sense of unity for us all. In a time when our political and cultural views feel more polar-

ized than ever, Tyson provides a much-needed antidote to so much of what divides us, while making a passionate case for the twin chariots of enlightenment—a cosmic perspective and the rationality of science. With crystalline prose, *Starry Messenger* walks us through the scientific palette that sees and paints the world differently. From insights on resolving global conflict to reminders of how precious it is to be alive, Tyson reveals, with warmth and eloquence, an array of brilliant and beautiful truths that apply to us all, informed and enlightened by knowledge of our place in the universe.

Neil deGrasse Tyson is an astrophysicist and the director of the Hayden Planetarium at the American Museum of Natural History.

Helen Greaves, *Testimony of Light* (Tarcher Perigee; Original edition June 25, 2009) Frances Banks died, as she had lived, fully aware of what she was experiencing and where she hoped to go. She was an Anglican nun for 25 years and for much of that time, the principal of the Teachers' Training College in Grahamstown, South Africa. Her friend Helen Greaves was by her side as she finally lapsed into unconsciousness. Then, one evening some three weeks after Frances's death, Helen sensed her presence.

This extraordinary encounter marked the beginning of contact between them from both sides of the veil—between life as we know it and life on "the other side." *Testimony of Light* is based on these communications that Helen received telepathically from Frances. The writings have been authenticated by those who knew them both and who were familiar with their individual writing styles. Moving and inspiring, this classic book is a testament to the enduring power of their friendship, and offers an important message to us all—that the death of the body is but a gentle passing to a much freer and fuller life.

Helen Greaves lived in the United Kingdom and was the author of several books of metaphysics. *Testimony of Light* has remained in print since it was first published in 1969 and it has touched the lives of many.

Diocesan Convention Report Convention Theme: Sing a New Song



The day started with Eucharist and the Bishop's address.

The bishop framed his address using two Bruce Springsteen songs *This is Radio Nowhere* and *The Rising*.

This is Radio Nowhere: "Is there anyone alive out there? I was spinning around a dead dial. Just another lost number in a file. Dancing down a dark hole Just searching for a world with some soul."

The Rising was written after 9/11 and starts off with a firefighter going up the stairs:

Can't see nothing in front of me. Can't see nothing come up behind. I make my way through this darkness.

Come on up for the Rising. Come on up lay your hands in mine. Come on up for the rising. Come on up for the rising tonight. I see you Mary in the garden. In the garden of a thousand sighs. There's holy pictures of our children Dancing in a sky filled with light. May I feel your arms around me. May I feel your blood mix with mine. A dream of life comes to me.

Bishop Fisher asks, "How can we get from "Radio Nowhere" to "The Rising?" How will God working in us get "The Rising" to be our song?

Bishop Fisher suggested that gratitude to God was a good place to start. He said, "It is amazing what gratitude can do: Gratitude frees us from fear. Releases us from anxiety. It emboldens us to do more than we could ever imagine."

What would happen if we started every vestry meeting, every diocesan meeting going around the room asking for expressions of gratitude.

He said that more times than Jesus said, "love one another," he said, "stay awake," "look," "see."

In closing he pondered: If our diocese had a patron saint who would it be? He offered for our consideration - Mary Magdalene. He said, "Mary loved Jesus. We love Jesus; and when he died a terrible death, she stayed faithful, stayed faithful at the cross.".

Other Convention Highlights

Bishop Fisher and Rev. Tanya Wallace reported on the shortened General Convention 2022, which they said was grounded in "The Way of Love".

We elected members of the diocesan Standing Committee, Diocesan Council and some other committees and boards (all uncontested).

We elected lay and clergy deputies and alternates to general convention 2024. The next Presiding Bishop will be elected in 2024 at General Convention by the House of Deputies and House of Bishops.

We heard a budget presentation and voted the budget.

We celebrated and blessed the 10th anniversary of consecration of Bishop Fisher.

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Mission Plate for December

The Mission Plate funds for December will go to the Mampong Babies Home.

The home, located in Mampong, Ghana was established 55 years ago (in 1967) by Sisters of The Order of the Holy Paraclete, after they observed that many babies were abandoned at the maternity hospital because their mothers had died in childbirth and their fathers and extended families were unable to bring those babies home to be properly cared for. The Home has a 50-bed capacity for children, aged 0-12 years old at any given time. Children are brought to the Mampong Babies Home as a result of various health and social-economic circumstances which include, but are not limited to abandonment, neglect, and severe poverty. We are grateful for your generosity of heart and spirit, as we all continue to be our brothers' and sisters' keepers.
