Sundays in January			

The journey of the magi is one of the first stories that we learn as children. It's an adventure story, a story of wonder and resilience, of boldness and humility. It resonates especially this year—in part, perhaps, because the next stage of your own journey toward new ministry will begin this year.

Many of you have been through numerous transitions; each one is unique and requires a radical openness to the Holy Spirit. This year, our transition will continue in four stages:

1. You will take a survey called the Congregational Assessment Tool (CAT), which is used by all congregations who are in transition in this diocese. It is an excellent tool for clarifying your core charisms & beliefs, identifying what resources you have and what you will need. Your vestry will discuss this tool at their meeting on January 4th, and it

will be introduced to you at the Annual Parish Meeting on January 29th. You will take this survey during the month of February, and Canon Simpson will discuss the results with your Vestry on March 11th.

- 2. In a series of small group discussions facilitated by members of the vestry, you will share these results and define your core mission. Then you will discuss a second question: Is this building essential or a hindrance to your ministry? If it is essential, what resources are necessary to maintain it as a center of ministry and how will you develop and manage those resources? If it is a hindrance, what are your other options for fulfilling the mission to which God calls you?
- 3. As part of this conversation, and following it,

your vestry will explore the wide range of models for ministry in our diocese, especially by congregations who have called parttime clergy.

4. When you have discerned your goals and model for ministry, you will be ready to prepare to call a new priest. I anticipate that this process will begin at the end of 2023 and continue into 2024.

There is no need to rush. We will continue at a steady pace. Like the journey of the magi, ours is guided by a Light we can trust. Our journey, too, will bring us to unexplored paths and unexpected signs of God's presence. And we too may know where and why we are going, but with no idea what our destination will look like.

I am so very grateful to share this journey with you.

# **January & February Mission Plate**

The Mission Plate funds for the months of January and February will be going to the Worcester Community Action Fuel Assistance Program. This program aids limited-income homeowners and renters in paying their home heating bills. WCAC's Fuel Assistance Program serves all of our local communities (cities and towns) within Central Massachusetts. Well over 10,000 households obtained fuel assistance through WCAC last year.

This year's economic picture for many of our vulnerable local families isn't any brighter than last year. With the devastating effects of the tripledemic (Covid, Flu, and RSV), rising housing and food costs and escalating utility and heating costs, many people in our local area are struggling to afford to keep themselves warm this winter.

Please, give as generously as you can to this program. No one should be left in the cold during this time of crisis. Thank you.

# **Sponsoring Mampong Babies**

#### Shifting from Childreach sponsor child to Mampong Babies Home in Kumasi, Ghana.

Our sponsor child, Nicholas, turned 18 on November 22, 2022! We started sponsoring Nicholas through Childreach (PLAN) in 2012 when he was 8 years old and at 18 he "graduated" from the Childreach Program. Rather than ask for another child to sponsor the vestry approved moving our monthly sponsorship to the Mampong Babies Home in Kumasi, Ghana.


Our diocese has had a companion relationship with the diocese of Kumasi, Ghana since 2008. Bishop and Rebecca Scruton, Bishop Doug and Besty Fisher, Rev. Annie Ryder and others have visited the diocese and in particular the Mampong Babies Home.

In 2014 Rev. Betsy Fisher started the "Change the Babies" ministry to support the Mampong Babies Home. Lana was at the diocesan convention that year and brought the idea back to Holy Trinity and we have been collecting money in the "BIG Bottle" ever since.

In January you will see a new monthly sign-up sheet to sponsor the Babies Home. The sponsorship money along with whatever is put in the Big Bottle will go to Change the Babies ministry/ Mampong Babies Home.

We will keep the parish updated on the Babies Home with articles in Tidings.



# Neil deGrasse Tyson, *Starry Messenger: Cosmic Perspectives on Civilization* Henry Holt and Co. (September 20, 2022)

Bringing his cosmic perspective to civilization on earth, Neil deGrasse Tyson shines new light on the crucial fault lines of our time—war, politics, religion, truth, beauty, gender, and race—in a way that stimulates a deeper sense of unity for us all. In a time when our political and cultural views feel more polarized than ever, Tyson provides a much-needed antidote to so much of what divides us, while making a passionate case for the twin chariots of enlightenment—a cosmic perspective and the rationality of science. With crystalline prose, *Starry Messenger* walks us through the scientific palette that sees and



paints the world differently. From insights on resolving global conflict to reminders of how precious it is to be alive, Tyson reveals, with warmth and eloquence, an array of brilliant and beautiful truths that apply to us all, informed and enlightened by knowledge of our place in the universe.

Neil deGrasse Tyson is an astrophysicist and the director of the Hayden Planetarium at the American Museum of Natural History.

#### Inclement Weather Plan: Winter 2023

Every Sunday in January and February, weather permitting, we will hold a service of Holy Communion at 9:30am that will be livestreamed on our Facebook Page. Please know that if, due to inclement weather, it is deemed necessary to cancel the service, an announcement will be posted on the Holy Trinity website (<a href="www.holytrinitysouthbridge.org">www.holytrinitysouthbridge.org</a>) and on our Facebook page, and an all-parish email will be sent out. Please consider the road conditions and parking availability when making your own decision to attend the service. We will continue to livestream our service every Sunday on our Facebook page, and the recorded service will be available on our website every week.

Please note that during a snow emergency Hamilton Street is an emergency route and NO parking is allowed on either side.

Parking regulations: alternate side parking on Hamilton Street December 1-April 1:

#### January 2023 - Relaunching Holy Trinity's Food Pantry donations!

Because of covid it has been some time since Holy Trinity has supported St. John Paul II's Food Pantry. I would like to encourage us all to participate in this important ministry once again.

For January, Mother Judith and I thought that a good item to donate would be **shelf-stable milk** (such as Parmalat or Horizon brands). I know these products are available at Big Bunny, Shaw's, Walmart and other local stores.

We are suggesting this because so many products donated to food pantries need milk – foods such as macaroni and cheese mixes, cereals, and soups that are more nutritious when they are made with milk. Unfortunately, milk is one of the least likely items to be donated. This is probably because most of us think first of fresh refrigerated milk when we think of milk – no matter what it is going to be used for. We might also think of powdered milk, but many of us recognize how powdered milk can seem unappealing as it is very low in fat. Because food pantries may not all have refrigeration, it may not always be possible to donate fresh milk. However, especially when milk is going to be used for cooking, there is another option – shelf-stable milk.

Shelf-stable milk is ordinary milk that has been Ultra High Temperature (UHT) pasteurized. This means that the milk is quickly heated to a very high temperature. The process destroys bacteria and gives the milk a longer shelf life (up to 6 months). It does not need to be refrigerated until it is opened.

We are asking that you contribute to the food pantry ministry by purchasing **shelf stable milk** as part of our Sunday offerings. In addition, if you can, we would like to continue a suggestion from before covid – that you also consider picking up a non-perishable food item that is something you would like to find if you were experiencing food scarcity. Is there some canned or packaged food item that would give you more than just ordinary sustenance? Share an item of that nature with people who need the food pantry – for remember the words of our Lord Jesus, who said: "Whatsoever you do to the least of your brothers and sisters, you do unto me."
