A Reflection from Your Priest-in-Charge

And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous. [Genesis 17:2]

I read this week about the world's largest tree, called Pando, which grows in a high mountain basin in central Utah. It is comprised of 47,000 stems, stems which appear to be individual trees, but are in fact one part of a genetically identical tree that spreads out over 106 acres and is connected by a massive interwoven root system. So what looks like a 106-acre forest of 47,000 trees, is actually one tree.

The Pando is a wonderful image of our relationship with God and with each other. As descendants of Abraham and Sarah, we know that no matter how far we wander from a place we call home, from the people who have shaped us and from what we thought we knew, we are not alone, for we are rooted in God's lifegiving promise. As followers of Jesus who have promised to walk the way of the cross, we know that in the moment when we feel most alone, when we see no reason to hope, in our darkest hour and our deepest shame, we will discover our inviolable and God-given wholeness--for we are rooted in God's life-giving mercy.

As you prepare to begin a partnership with Bethlehem Lutheran, we walk with Abraham and Sarah, trusting in the promise of a God who has watched over us on a journey that has brought us into an ever-expanding world, and has been grounded in life-giving relationships.

And we walk with Jesus promising to take up our cross—to set our mind on divine things, to embrace our vulnerability, to witness justice and resist complacency, to reclaim the deeply-rooted relationships with God and with each other that will sustain us in this new and ancient landscape as we grow into God's purpose for us together.

In the words of Steven Charleston, former Episcopal bishop of Alaska and Chocktaw elder,

We will walk together through this lonely stretch of road, all of us who have come this far into the valley of shadows. We will not be afraid or anxious, for we have one another. We have our shared strength, our common wisdom, and our collective memory to help us through whatever may come. We have the quiet counsel of our elders and the boundless energy of our young ones. We have the depth of faith of many courageous hearts. We have the resilience and experience of all those among us who have passed this way before. And when the going gets hard, we have a thousand voices to sing, singing as we go along the twisted path toward higher ground, where the shadows will be far behind

Building a Partnership with Bethlehem Lutheran Church

On December 13, 2023 the Vestry voted to begin conversations with Bethlehem Lutheran about sharing clergy, and a meeting was held in January with the senior leadership from each church. At Bethlehem Lutheran's parish meeting on February 4th their congregation unanimously agreed to begin this conversation about sharing clergy.

February 25th—Pulpit Swap: Pastor Dan Purtell presided and Preached at Holy Trinity and met with the Vestry.

March 4th—Pastor Dan will meet with Holy Trinity's Pastoral Relations Committee to learn more about how we build relationships within our community and about our pastoral priorities.

March 10th, the Holy Trinity Vestry and Bethlehem Lutheran's Council will meet at Holy Trinity for an afternoon retreat led by Pastor Sara Anderson, Associate to the Bishop of the New England Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and Father Rich Simpson, Canon to the Ordinary for the Episcopal Diocese of Western Massachusetts. At this retreat we will together work out the details and logistics for our partnership.

2024 will continue to be a year of transition for both congregations, and for Pastor Dan, a year of learning in faith and grace as you grow into this new thing that God has promised.

March & April Mission Plate: Meals on Wheels America



Meals on Wheels America supports community-based programs dedicated primarily to addressing senior hunger and isolation. Their vision statement shares their hope for "an America in which all seniors live nourished lives with independence and dignity," and their mission statement stresses their desire "to empower local community programs to improve the health and quality of life of the seniors they serve so that no one is left hungry or isolated" (https://www.mealsonwheelsamerica.org/).

To support their vision and mission, Meals on Wheels is staffed mainly by community volunteers. However, Meals on Wheels delivers more to seniors than just food. The meal is only the first step. While the meals help seniors remain independent, those meals in combination with the accompanying human interaction provide more than just independence. The meals along with the attention of the volunteers who deliver them provide seniors with access to tailored nutrition, social connection, and safety. Our donations to Meals on Wheels America, provide funding, programming, education, research, and advocacy. Indeed, their website claims, "Meals on Wheels America empowers its local member programs to strengthen their communities, one senior at a time" (https:// www.mealsonwheelsamerica.org/).

Significant statistical data from the Meals on Wheels website:

- One in four Americans is 60+ and 12,000 more turn 60 each day!
- Among Americans 60 and older, 29 % have a disability, 24% live alone, and 12% are veterans.
- Seniors on fixed incomes are especially vulnerable to inflation.
- Older adults are already at greater risk of malnutrition because of decreased appetite, mobility issues and prescription medications
- Of older Americans who receive help from Meals on Wheels:

77% say the meals improve their health.85% say they feel more secure.92% report that the meals help them live independently.

Meals on Wheels starts with nutritious meals, but those meals create an opportunity for relationships to flourish and community connections to bloom and thrive. Those connections can then be used to identify needs and provide services that help seniors stay in their homes and feel independent yet supported. Meals on Wheels promotes good nutrition and social connection for seniors, thus improving their mental and physical health and wellbeing.
