June Mission Plate

The Mission Plate Funds for the months of May and June will be going to

"Journey's End Refugee Services." Journey's End Refugee Services is a Christian - Community based organization with the mission of welcoming refugees without regard to ethnic origin or creed and to assist them to become healthy, independent, contributing members of the community. "Journey's End Refugee Services" is based in Buffalo, New York.

This organization provides essential support to refugees and immigrant communities, including immigration legal services, employment, education for adult English language learners, interpretation and translation, mentoring, and more. Volunteers aid in setting up apartments, and through donations provide beds, household items, etc., for these families who have been forced to leave their native lands and homes to escape poverty, hunger, war, persecution, and violence. In 2023, Journey's End Refugee Services assisted 2,050 new cases through their Immigration Legal Services Program, including naturalization, family reunification, asylum and more.

Recently, Journey's End Refugee Services has been forced to cut 20 staff members following an executive order from President Donald Trump which suspended the Refugee Admission Program, citing public safety and national security concerns. Journey's End says that more than 80% of its funding comes from this program. The organization remains committed to their mission and will continue to provide essential support to refugees and immigrant communities.

The Episcopal Diocese of Western Ma., with its Social Justice Commission continues to welcome, support, and assist refugee and immigrant families toward becoming independent, contributing members of our communities.

In an announcement from the Right Reverend Dr. Douglas J. Fisher on April 10, 2025, he strongly commented on the unjust treatment that many of our refugees and immigrants are facing, he wrote: "The appalling disregard for the dignity of all human beings is NOT OK, It is just not right ..." "Only love will defeat what is straining to co-opt our humanity and make us enemies of one another."

This quote from Leviticus 19.34 says it all: "The foreigner who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you. You shall love the foreigner as yourself, for you were foreigners in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God."

Please pray for the refugees and immigrants living within our communities, states, and country. We all came from somewhere. Please, give what you can to

Journey's End Refugee Services since much of their governmental funding has been cut.

Sharing the Good News: An Easter Reflection

Did you ever have news that was so exciting, so important, so urgent, that you could not wait to share it? Imagine the spice-bearing women who encounter the Angels at the empty tomb learning that it was all true - everything that Jesus had told them would happen had, indeed, happened. They rushed from what had been a moment of ritual grief and mourning and ran to tell the other followers of Jesus what they had witnessed.

Easter gives us a whole year's worth of joy and light and excitement in one glorious moment. As we hear the triple Alleluia for the first time, the spark is ignited within us, and our souls are alight with the need to share this joy with others. Smiles are broad and handshakes are enthusiastic on Easter Sunday in church.

This is the exact spirit which we carry with us all year that inspires us to share not only the Good News, but also the ways in which our lives have been transformed by God's blessings. We share our time, talent, and treasure freely because of the love we have experienced in redemption and in the death-defying power of Jesus and his ministry in the world. Such an enthusiasm cannot be contained, it must be recounted. Like Peter, who was skeptical when the women came to tell him of the Resurrection, others might wonder what has gotten into us: why we are so willing to release our gifts into the world rather than safeguard them in a tomb. But we who have experienced the destruction of darkness and the return of the light will know why we do what we do. It is a story we will rush to share with the world.
